Summary of the July 23, 2011 MSGS Board Meeting

President Shawna Valentine called the July 23, 2011 MSGS Board meeting to order at 10 AM in the Library in Helena, Montana. Roll was taken and the minutes were read by Secretary Marilyn Lewis. Treasurer Carol Woodley reported we have \$1181.56 in the checking account and \$11544.92 in the savings account. Several small bills were presented and paid from the First Family-Early Settler account.

Verba Valentine, 1st Vice-President, reported on the plans for the Kalispell Conference to be held September 22-24, 2011 at the Hilton

Garden Inn. There have been several changes in speakers. John Fraley from Fish, Wildlife and Parks will be the banquet speaker. Reid's in Lewistown will be doing the T-shirts again and will sell for \$12 and \$14 each. Be sure and get your rooms reserved early! We will need help filling tote bags and getting ready for the book frolic. Last year we had trouble with our lavalier microphone. Renting one costs about \$125 per day and a new one runs about \$299. It was decided to buy a new one.

Shirley Rogers, 2nd Vice-President, is working on raffle items. She has the pins and reminded us to bring door prizes. Please do NOT bring periodicals or fiction books for the book frolic.

Mary Pitch, Registrar, reported we have 16 societies with 646 members.

Fern Kauffman, First Families, has been getting new applications for First Families and Early Settlers, but we need to do more promoting. Alene Stoner suggested that we could send application forms with answers to queries and have each society have forms available for their members.

The following offices will be elected at the annual conference, 2nd Vice-President, Secretary and Registrar. The present officers were nominated for another term, Shirley Rogers, Marilyn Lewis and Mary Pitch.

Karen Huck, Librarian, reported the canopies for the book shelves have been received and installed. She and Mary Pitch will attend the Montana Shared Catalog meeting October 6-7, 2011 in Bozeman. She had a great time in Salt Lake City at the Family History Center using the free motel stay she won at last year's conference. Mary Pitch went with her and they found many records about their families.

FGS delegate Shirley Rogers is making a Montana map pinpointing society locations and she wants brochures from the societies by August 20 to display at the FGS conference in Springfield, Illinois in September.

Shawna Valentine wants to change our website address to something easier, such as montanamsgs.org. She has checked into listing with godaddy for \$14.99 for 10 years.

Under old business the 1930 census project is nearly done. Lake County is finished, Prairie County is nearly done, Missoula County has a few gaps to fill in and the only one left is Sheridan County. As soon as it is finished it will be put on a CD. Each society will receive a free CD. We are hoping to be done by conference.

The next Board meeting will be at the Kalispell Conference on September 22, 2011 at 3:30 PM and the following one October 15, 2011 at 10 AM in Helena.

CASCADE COUNTY RECORDS BEING DIGITIZED FOR PUBLIC VIEWING

Peter Day from the Utah Genealogical Society, and Field Supervisor for Family Search International, is in Great Falls filming genealogical records which will eventually be online under the Family Search website. His travels have taken him throughout the United States and Canada as he first microfilmed and now digitized these important records. He will be in Great Falls for at least five or six months as he digitizes many of the early Cascade County records stored by GFGS and the History Museum. By July 18th, 20,000 images have been digitized, and the first images are out on Family Search. They have not yet been indexed, but are available for browsing.

Park County Genealogy Society

Park County Genealogy Society has been working with the County Commissioners to utilize funds that have been earmarked for the restoration and preservation of two historic cemeteries in Park County, as well as other public cemeteries located between Livingston and Jardine. Old Chico (1864) and Emigrant (1885) cemeteries are situated in the Paradise Valley half way between Livingston and Yellowstone National Park. As unique cultural resources in need of accurate interpretation and extensive repairs, the cemeteries have been identified as priority projects for the funding. Since 2007, society members, Carol Woodley and Sharron Munro have worked to update burial records and, with Park County Historian Jerry Brekke, to create a plan for restoring and interpreting the cemeteries. Carol assisted interested community members to organize cemetery associations; the "The Friends of the Emigrant Cemetery" and "Old Chico Cemetery Association". At our May meeting we toured the Park County Basement Vault showing off some of the interesting and important records that are the beginning of our county when it was split from Gallatin County. Park County was carved out of Gallatin County when Governor Hauser was in office from July 14, 1885 to February 7, 1887.

Mardi Whitmore presented a beginners genealogy workshop for the Livingston Public Library summer youth program the 23rd of June with 12 attending, while Connie Standish and Carol Woodley attended a work meeting with Matt Davidson, Data Image from Billings taught us how to place our Basement Vault Indexes into the Park County off Site Silo so eventually the public will have access to these records.

Our June meeting on the 28th was a cemetery walk at the Emigrant Cemetery with Sharron Munro as our guide and host for a very nice picnic at her residence at 120 Eight Mile Creek, near Emigrant, Montana. Sharron has been instrumental in compiling Emigrant Cemetery records and continues to assist the community in the on-going interpretation of this historically significant cemetery.

Then on July 12th we conducted a cemetery walk at the Old Chico Cemetery sponsored by the Old Chico Cemetery Association, with Carol Woodley acting as the guide for the group attending. About 25 people turned out to visit the graves and talk about the many people buried in this old cemetery. A potluck picnic followed the presentation. We are proud and pleased that these two cemeteries have created a large interest in genealogy research and the communities are taking an active interest in what will become of the cemeteries in the Yellowstone Valley.

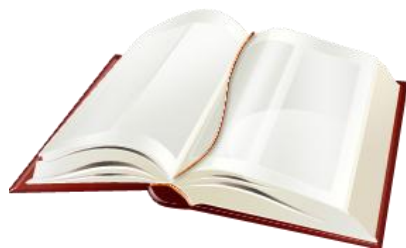

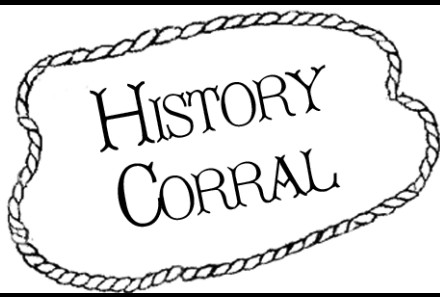
Finding the books that are in the genealogy library is easy. If you are in the library, you can double click on the icon on the desktop that says "Library catalog". At home you can find the catalog many different ways:

- www.mymontanalibrary.org (Montana Shared Catalog)
 - Then use the first pull down menu and select Montana State Genealogical Society Library (you can also get to the Montana Historical catalog also)
- www.rootsweb.ancestry.com/~mtmsg/ (Montana State Genealogical Society website)
 - The 3rd paragraph has the website hi-lighted and you can click on it and go to the website
- www.rootsweb.ancestry.com/~mtlcgs (Lewis and Clark Genealogical Society)
 - at the top click on Library hours and Staff
 - click on library catalog

Do you know of a book and wonder what library it is located in? You can research OCLC (online computer library catalog) by going to www.worldcat.org.

- You can input the title of the book and hit enter.
- When the book title comes up, click on it.
 - On the bottom half of the page, enter your location
 - It will show you which libraries have the book, you can click on any library to go into their library catalog.
 - If we do not have the book, work with your local library and see if they can interlibrary loan the book from the other resource.

If you are researching in an area, just use an internet search engine and look for their local library. Many have genealogy databases. If nothing there, look for historical and genealogical societies where your relatives lived.

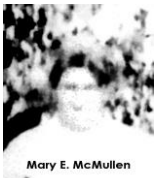

The prairie grass whispers in the wind, cattle move through as they graze there in the summer. The prairie is dotted with gas well huts, and rutted with tracks of the trucks used to service them. Such is the fate of many places in Montana where ghost dreams of fresh starts and land ownership can be heard if you sit at any abandoned homestead. Mine just happened to be personal because Mary was my paternal grandmother.



Mary E. McMullen

In April of 1917, according to the post card Mary sent to her daughter, the McMullen's left their 120 acre homestead in North Dakota to homestead in Montana where more land was available. T. P., the father had left earlier in the car with a grown son, Mike. Later, another son who was remaining in N. Dakota took Mary and the remaining four children to catch the train in Dickinson, N. Dakota. Their destination was Malta, Montana where Mary E.

McMullen would file on 320 acres in Northern Phillips County. Mary was 48 years of age at this time. She married T. P. when she was 15 years of age and he was 31. She had given birth to 14 children, two of whom died in infancy of diphtheria. She had moved with her ever growing family many times. She was born in Indiana, married in Mt. Ayr, Iowa, moved to Kingman, Kansas, back to Iowa, and to several areas in North Dakota. Most of her children were grown, married, and living their own lives by the time she came to Montana. Her husband never seemed able to settle to anything, and make a success of it for very long. This move would be their last hope for a fresh start.



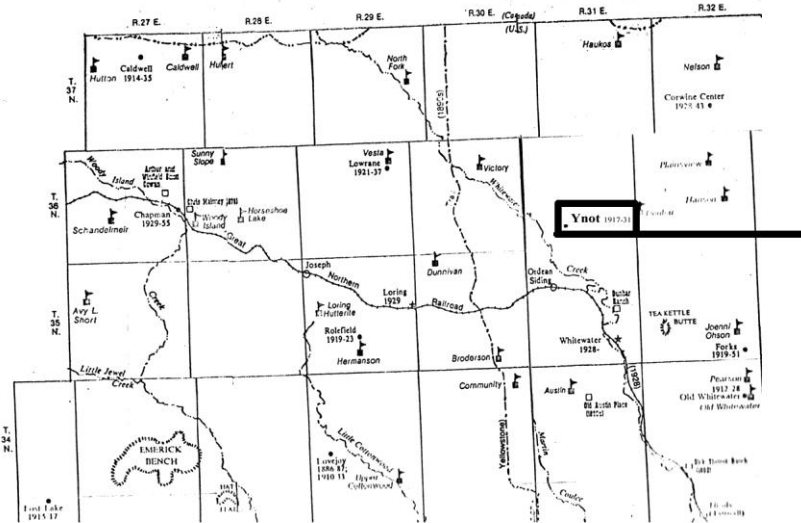
Ynot Post Office & Store

When she was settled on the land in Montana, she was approached to take the post office for the area. With no other towns in the area she opened the first, and only post office, and store at Ynot, Montana. For a brief time things thrived. They broke land, built a number of buildings, and according to the pictures there were trees, and gardens about the place. Those who remembered her marveled at her ability to be cheerful and uncomplaining no matter what she faced. In one of the letters that her son wrote he says she has asked him for money, but he didn't give it to her because he was sure his father would get it.

Soon their luck was once again draining away like sand through an hour glass. It wasn't long before the drought hit Montana, and people began leaving the area in droves. They found that even with more land it was impossible to make a living. Mary's fresh start was dwindling. Two more sons died in 1918. One in World War I, and the other of a gunshot wound. The remaining daughters married, and moved away. Mary's health

began to decline. She was diagnosed with Bright's disease (kidney infection). At this time there were no antibiotics to cure her. Her health quickly began to decline as did her husband's. In desperation, T. P. took out a loan he couldn't repay.

In 1931, when they were both ill and broke, they abandoned Ynot to return to N. Dakota, to live with one of their daughters. Mary succumbed at the end of 1931 and her husband shortly thereafter. Only my father remained in Montana to prove up his own homestead.

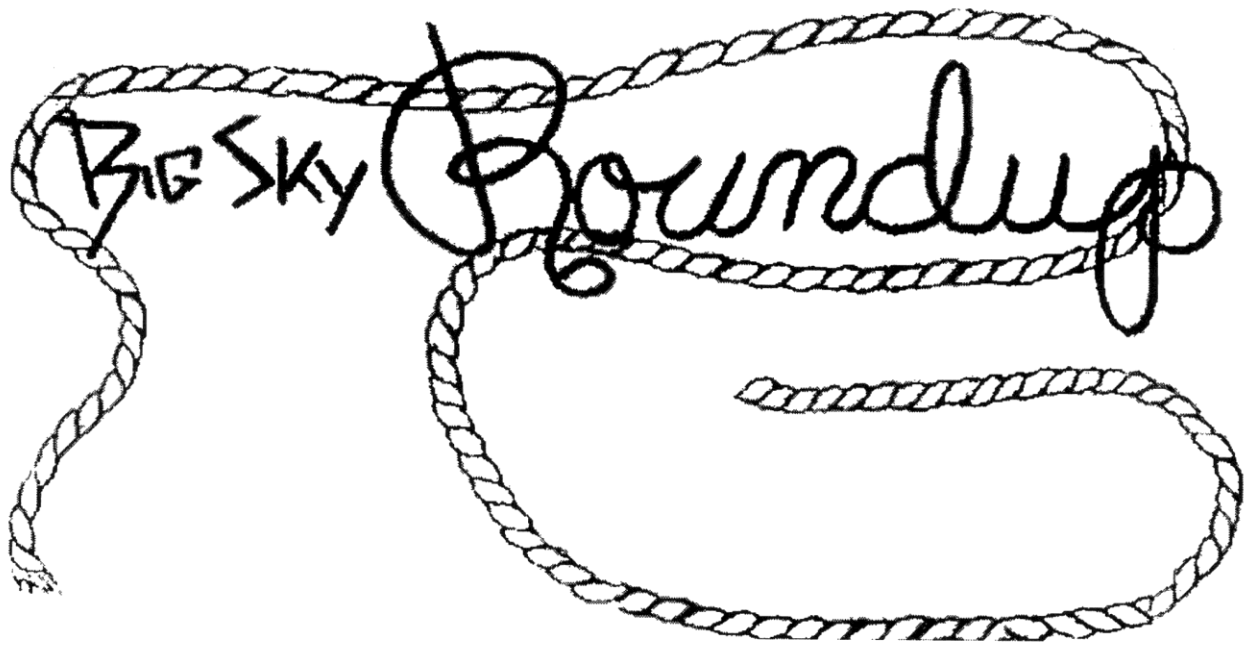
