Summary of the 18 July 2015 MSGS Board Meeting



Shawna Valentine, President, called the meeting to order at 10: 06 AM. Those present were Shawna Valentine, Verba Valentine, Terry Atwood, Shirley Rogers, Mary Pitch, Marilyn Lewis, Al Stoner, and Kathy Patrick. Minutes from the last meeting were read and approved. Treasurer's report showed \$381.06 in checking account and savings account has \$17,269.09.

1st Vice President's report by Verba Valentine: **2015 Conference** – Butte (September 24, 25, 26) Arrangements for speakers flying into Butte are difficult and are the cause of added expense. When asked about the possibility of a Skype presentation Verba turned it down and was backed by the Board in that decision. Another unforeseen expense was liability insurance needed at the Butte Civic Center. A good turnout at the conference will offset some of these unexpected expenses. Verba needs to know how many Societies will need a table for the conference. Vendors who are not a member of a Montana Society will be charged conference fee as the tables are located in the same room as the speakers. Conference attendees will have an opportunity to share two surnames and two locations they are researching. This information will be posted on a bulletin board. We will be selling previous state conference t-shirts on the state table. **2016 Conference** – Missoula (September 22, 23, 24th. The theme is "Linking Our Trails". Amy Johnson Crow who speaks on Civil War and methodology has been booked. She will pair well with Judy Russell, The Legal Genealogist. We are looking for a local banquet speaker and activity. The Missoula Society has suggested an excellent speaker on the "Irish in Montana" for the banquet, but the board felt we needed something besides Irish since the last 2 years have focused on the British Isles.

2nd Vice President's Report – Shirley Rogers: We reviewed the pins. They are in shipment. Shirley is working on door prizes. She will be absent for part of the conference. We need people to help with the state table.

Mary Pitch delivered the Registrar's report. We have dropped Lincoln County from the list of Society members. Mary has contacted Societies that need to pay their dues.

Committee Reports:

First Families & Early Settlers – Volume IV – Shawna reported that this edition will have roughly 210 pages. The phrase "submitted by" is being added to stories to cover any copyright issues. This edition contains 100 different submitters. Al Stoner presented an inventory of current books and recommended reassessing what we want to print in view of the inventory we are carrying. We discussed marketing and pricing for past volumes and Vol. IV.

Nominating Committee – The 2nd Vice President and Registrar are willing to stand for re-election. We are in need of a secretary.

Old Business: Marilyn Lewis shared the Central Montana Genealogy Society brochure showing what records the county offices hold. This was followed by a discussion of the best way to collect each county's holdings and make that available to the public.

New Business: The next Board Meeting will be at the Butte Civic Center (meeting room up-stairs), Thursday September 24, 2015 at 3:30 pm. The date for the October 2015 Board Meeting is Oct. 17th in Helena.

Genealogists' Declaration of Rights - We Need Your Support!

- Did you know that a date of death is no longer added to the Social Security Death Index until three years after the event occurs?
- Did you know the State Vital Records Officers have a Model Act which if passed in your state will close access to birth records for 125 years, marriage records for 100 years, & death records for 75 years?

GENEALOGISTS NEED TO WORK TOGETHER AND SPEAK-UP IF WE ARE TO REVERSE THESE RECENT TRENDS! We need to let Congress and our state legislatures know that genealogists need access to public records and **GENEALOGISTS VOTE!** You can help by signing the Genealogists' Declaration of Rights and by asking the societies to which you belong to encourage members to also sign the Declaration.

The Records Preservation and Access Committee (RPAC) has obtained 8,000 signatures over the last year including more than 1,500 at the national genealogy conferences, over 2,300 at regional, state, and local societies, and 4,100 online signatures. **WE NEED 10,000 SIGNATURES BY THE END OF 2015 FOR GENEALOGISTS TO MAKE A STRONG STATEMENT IN SUPPORT OF OPEN ACCESS TO PUBLIC RECORDS.**

Keep reading if you want more details about how access for genealogists has been restricted this year. There's bad news, but there's good news, too.

- Section 203 of the 2013 Bipartisan Budget Act, which went into effect 29 March 2014, closed access to the Death Master File (used by genealogists as the Social Security Death Index) for three years after an individual's death. Access during the three-year embargo is limited to persons certified by the Commerce Department. Certification costs \$400; the annual cost to access the data is \$995; the available data is limited; the search engine inadequate, and new audit and security requirements will make access unaffordable by even professional genealogists.
- Since 1 November 2011, the public DMF/SSDI has omitted those deaths which were reported only by states. The Social Security Administration also omits geographic data, although data aggregators such as Ancestry have been able to add data such as state of issue back into the SSDI based upon the first three digits of the SSN.
- Genealogists have had no access to death records in Oklahoma since a version of the 2011 Revision of the Model Vital Statistics Act was passed in 2012. Efforts to amend the law and provide access to attorneys did not make it out of committee in the 2015 legislative session.
- The Kansas Supreme Court has a proposed Rule 106 which would redact the mother's maiden name, date of birth, and city and state of birth from marriage licenses. RPAC and Kansas genealogy organizations have written the court but the procedures for implementation of a judicial rule are not clear so RPAC is continuing to follow up.

Where genealogists have been actively involved, access to vital records has improved. On a positive note genealogists from some states have been able to reverse the closure trend:

- Death Records in Virginia are closed for only 25 years. Images of Virginia Death Records 1912-2014 and Marriage Records 1936-2014 are available at the Library of Virginia and on Ancestry.com through 1987. See the 14 June 2015 RPAC Blog post, "Virginia Vital Records Online," at <http://www.fgs.org/RPAC> for more details.
- Pennsylvania death records have been digitized from 1906 to 1963 and are also available in the state and on Ancestry.com. Pennsylvania death records are closed for 50 years.
- The Michigan State Archives has recently added free digitized copies of death records from 1921-1952 to its earlier collection of imaged death records from 1897-1920.

Gallatin County Genealogical Society – Bozeman

During a busy spring, the society made significant progress on indexing probated wills, learned about determining kinship with DNA, celebrated its third anniversary and elected officers for 2015-2016.

Index Project Update: A small group of dedicated indexers continued re-boxing and indexing probated wills located at the Law and Justice Center in Bozeman. In the past six months, they have indexed over 2600 wills dating from 1886 to 1976. Plans call for indexing all wills up to the present.

In April, President Bonnie Jackson gave an excellent presentation on determining kinship with DNA. She covered numerous topics including what DNA is; different types of DNA testing; how DNA testing can help find relatives and determine ethnic origin; the three most popular autosomal DNA kits on the market; and the types of genealogical information that can be gained from Ancestry DNA and 23andMe. She also provided a comprehensive handout for reference and sources of additional information.

The society celebrated its third anniversary since its reactivation in 2012. The group shared cake, punch and personal stories of successful genealogy research over the past year. Members also celebrated the indexing of over 120,000 records in the past three years and ending the year with 46 active members. Before breaking for the summer, all current officers were re-elected for the 2015-2016 membership year: Bonnie Jackson, President; Karen Maika, Vice President; Linda Gengenbacher, Secretary; Norma Ardesson, Treasurer; Tricia Thompson, Project Manager; Jenn Vieth, Webmaster; and Carol Elliott, State Liaison.

Great Falls Genealogy Society – Great Falls

Great Falls Genealogy Society Celebrates Its 40th Year!

Great Falls Genealogy Society has been at the local Farmer's Market several times during summer of 2015, letting people know about our Society, its conservation efforts with Cascade County records, and celebrating our 40th year as a Society and a Library. We continue to work at conserving and indexing Cascade County records, as noted in this Projects Update:

Work on the Ursuline Center Historical Records Inventory is about 70% complete. Three GFGS volunteers, Larry Spicer, Linda Long, and Janet Thomson continue to work with Sister Frances Porter on Monday and Thursday mornings in the Ursuline Archives. When complete, the Historical Records Inventory will be available at the Ursuline Center, the Great Falls Genealogy Society Library, the Great Falls History Museum, and other places as designated by Sister Porter. The Records Inventory encompasses materials from five states, and includes Ursuline Convent and School Records, many Indian school missions, and photos (brief description).

The GFGS Project to copy the Cascade County Inquests (1887, forward) continues. Members of the crew have completed copying several boxes of these fragile records, in cooperation with the History Museum, where the originals will be maintained. When complete, GFGS will have a copy of each available inquest. GFGS also has the Cascade County Coroner Registers, and has indexed both collections, previously.

Still another project that has just begun is the indexing of the recently acquired Chapel of Chimes Mortuary records. When complete, the index will encompass about 40 years of burial information for the Chapel of Chimes, which operated in Great Falls until purchased by Schnider Funeral Home. This is the second set of mortuary records given to GSGS for safe keeping and conserving.

Yellowstone Genealogy Forum – Billings

Spring started with a program on medical records. Carol Turbes of St. Vincent Healthcare Medical Records discussed accessing medical records and the laws behind regulations on them. Her source was the journal for the American Health Information Management Association FAQ's. <http://journal.ahima.org/2013/04/01/accessing-deceased-patient-health-records-faq/>

In May is the club's annual meeting: election of officers, recognition of volunteers, accomplishments over the past year, and dessert. Officers elected were Laura Haefer, Treasurer; Irene Nelson, Recording Secretary; Ann Ferguson & Kay Cahill, Program Coordinators; Bobbie Meyers, Corresponding Secretary; P. J. Smith, President. The program for the evening was on Germans from Russia. (The American Historical Society of Germans from Russia held its annual conference in Billings July 13-18.)

Ed Saunders, retired Army, is documenting World War I nurses interred in Yellowstone County. He presented a program on finding and preserving family American military history. He gave information on what records are available and how to receive copies of them, from the Revolutionary War to present.

Ancestry Library Edition is used by many people. Forum members presented a program and hands-on help at the Billings Public Library computer room. To help them understand what documents they are finding on Ancestry, P. J. Smith reviewed each type of document, such as census records, birth, marriage, and death records, city directories, and military records. Ten people attended the program, and three members helped.

An agreement between Billings Public Library and the Forum was updated and signed. In return for the library providing space for the Forum to house its research collection, the Forum answers genealogy queries mailed to the library and assists library patrons with research. In 2014-2015, the Forum had eleven members who volunteered 430 hours. There were 280 visitors. Through donations and books purchased by the book selection committee, the Forum's research collection expanded by 69 books,

Walter Bradshaw, World Champion Hammerman

For fifteen minutes, it was man against rock. The drill was placed and the blows began. Water spewed out of the hole as drills went deeper and deeper into a massive slab of granite. Two men working together transformed the strength and skills of the every-day miner into events that created champions based on who could drill the deepest hole. One man would hammer a heavy sledge upon a drill that was held by the other on the granite. Drills had to be rotated and changed as the hole grew. Timing between the partners was paramount. To win, the hammer had to maintain its rhythm and the drill had to be rotated and changed between blows. And in the height of West's mining era of the early 1900's, the fifteen minutes was also a competition of one mining town against another.

Known as hard rock drilling contests, the competitions were very popular. Miners enjoyed them as they exalted the exact skills and tools that they used every day into heroic possibilities. Competitions held on elevated platforms usually spotlighted Fourth of July, Miner Union Day, and Labor Day festivities. It was not uncommon to draw over 10,000 spectators and teams from as far away as Arizona. Betting was widespread. In Helena, a competition on Labor Day, 1 September 1901 featured five Montana teams, "two from Butte, two from Marysville and one from Clancy."¹ The Butte team of Walter Bradshaw and Joe Freethy won that day. Twenty-three days later the same team would break the World's Drilling Record in Spokane by drilling through 55 inches. That record was never surpassed.

Although he was actually born in Iowa on February 3, 1873, by 1880 Walter Bradshaw was living in the mining areas of Jefferson County, Colorado. The son of John and Martha Griffith Bradshaw, Walter grew up in the mining camps of Clear Creek County, Colorado and always claimed that state as his place of birth. In 1893 he, his widowed mother, and his brother Charles moved to Butte where the two boys found employment as blacksmiths.² By 1901, Walter began competing in the new sport of Hard Rock Drilling Contests and his skill, speed and strength soon catapulted him to the being one of the best "hammermen" the sport of hard rock drilling contests ever saw. Weighing over 220 pounds, Walter had the brawn. However, he was best known for his stamina and speed. Averaging between 70 and 80 blows a minute, the rapid, steady blows of his heavy sledge sounded like an "elephant jumping on a bass drum".³

By 1908, the popularity of the sport led to the idea an exhibition tournament to be held at Madison Square Garden in New York. Despite experiencing some health problems just before the trip, Walter and his partner Mike McNickolls traveled to New York only to find the promoter had left town, leaving the entire event in limbo. In addition, the change in climate worsened Walter's condition which led to an operation and a 15 day hospital stay just after he and his partner drilled. Although he stated "I could not do myself justice, and we got but 41 5/8 inches" Walter refused to admit he lost. He would only admit that the other team "made a better record than we did."⁴

With the rise of mechanization, the need of the human drillers in the mines and the popularity of the drilling contests waned. Walter became a mining engineer and worked in Idaho and at Maiden in Fergus County, Montana. He married Emma Neary in Butte on 8 July 1903, but the couple never had any children. She died 13 December 1949. Walter continued to live in Butte until his death on 29 September 1957 at the age of 85. The colorful icon of a segment of western mining history was laid to rest in the Missoula Cemetery, Missoula, Montana. He left no known survivors.

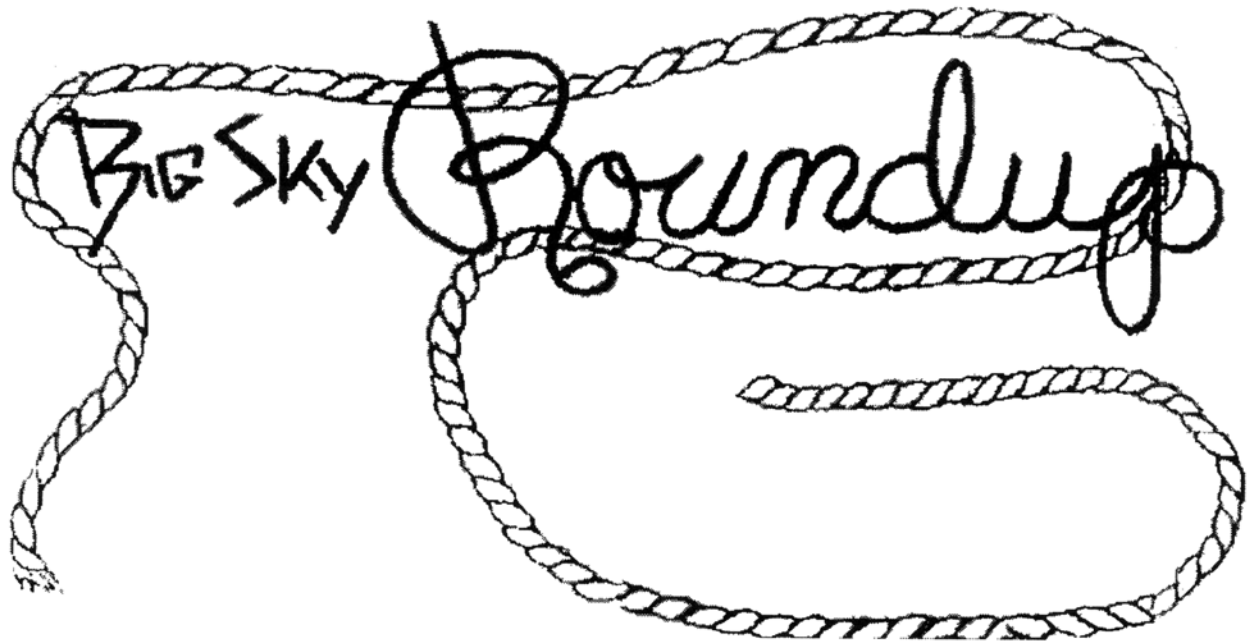
