
The next Board meeting will be Wednesday, January 7 th, 2026 at 10:00am and will be a Strategic Plan Review session.

Local Society Updates


Yellowstone Genealogy Forum

During the 22 July 2025 Yellowstone Genealogy Forum meeting, members shared memories of family vacations. Visits to family topped the list of happy remembrances. Getting to know extended families of grandparents and great-greats, aunts, uncles and cousins filled members' summers. These visits may have planted the seeds of future interest in genealogy. One member and her husband followed their ancestors' migration through many states, including a visit to the Mayo Clinic after learning a relative was a childhood friend of the Mayo brothers.

At our 26 August 2025 meeting, we had an indepth Zoom presentation, "Ever-Growing Tree: Descendancy Research and DNA Matches", by Kate Penney Howard of Fort Wayne, Indiana.

In traditional ascendency genealogy, we start with a person, usually us, and then work back in time. In descendancy research (also known as reverse genealogy or forward genealogy), we start with a person, a great-great uncle, for example, and work forward in time, gathering facts about him and all of his descendants.

Although there are differences between the two types of research, they share some of the same sources all genealogists are familiar with. In addition to answering genealogy questions, descendancy genealogy can help with medical and legal issues.

At our 23 September 2025 meeting, we watched two YouTube videos about FamilySearch created by the Fresno North Stake FamilySearch Center.

In other news, YGF members continue to staff its Genealogy Library at the Billings Community and Senior Center every weekday, 1 to 3 p.m. We answer genealogy questions from the public and guide them through family research on the center's computer. Members also provide informational programs on a variety of topics. We recently passed our first-year anniversary at the center!

Our president P.J. Smith and other members have given genealogy programs at Billings senior living facilities and in outlying areas. P.J. recently sent letters out to all Billings senior living facilities to offer our genealogy programs. Some facilities also plan to bring groups of their residents to the Billings Community and Senior Center to learn more.

P.J. Smith and our webmaster Kathy Robins are working on a new YGF website that should be running by next summer.

Thirteen members of our society attended the state conference in Great Falls and had a great time! Here is a photo of our group from the conference.




Great Falls Genealogy Society
