## Yellowstone Genealogy Forum (Billings)

Yellowstone Genealogy Forum members Kay Cahill, Laura Haefer, Kathy Robins, Janet Clark and Shelley Green attended the Montana State Genealogy conference in Great Falls, 18-20 September. At the gathering, Kay won a Journal Jar, which is a Mason Jar filled with tips on how to write a family history. The Journal Jars were created by Great Falls Genealogy Society.

At our regular meeting in October, Melody Dodson, who grew up in McCone County, spoke about her America Doorstop Project, a program preserving stories about agricultural history. After publishing books on Nebraska and Montana ag history, she's working on one for North Dakota.

At our November meeting, Neal Gunnells, executive director of the Huntley Project Museum, presented a history of the federal irrigation project created in the early 20th century to bring water to arid land northeast of Billings for farming and settlement. If you haven't visited this gem of a museum in Yellowstone County, please go, particularly if you have Eastern Montana ancestors.

During 2025, YGF president P. J. Smith and member Heide Reed logged many miles in Billings and surrounding areas teaching genealogy classes to residents in senior-care facilities. Some of their students then visited our Genealogy Library in person.

YGF members continue to present programs for the Billings Community and Senior Center (BCSC), including one about Montana women serving in the U.S. military in November. We also sponsored a community cookie exchange in December.

Volunteers staff our BCSC genealogy library two hours every weekday. Our library computer now has several PDFs of valuable local genealogy data, which is available to the public. They include an index of obituaries from *The Billings Gazette*, 1956-1970; Yellowstone County marriage records 1881-1899; history and locations of cemeteries in Yellowstone County; Carbon County cemeteries; and Yellowstone County School Censuses, 1914-1930. We also have Smith Funeral Home and Billings First Congregational Church records. This extensive research tool is the result of hundreds of hours of work by previous and current YGF members. Current president, P.J. Smith, digitalized the information to make it more accessible to the public. Thank you P.J. and others involved!

## Lewis & Clark County Genealogical Society

Fall in Helena was beautiful last year, and Lewis and Clark County Genealogical Society enjoyed some great programs.

In October we had the privilege of hearing the story of John Kunz from Great Falls. He was born in a Nazi slave labor concentration camp during World War II. He arrived in the U.S. as a refugee at age six and his family settled near Great Falls. He shared the sobering and riveting story of his family's journey, survival, and gratitude. It was an amazing story and reminder about how the events in Germany with the Nazi regime are not very far behind us.

In November I presented about my work with the Navy and Defense POW-MIA Accounting Agency and their effort to account for servicemen from World War II, Korea, and Vietnam who have never been accounted for. They are now using DNA to identify remains of unknown soldiers. They are going back to war graves, crash sites, shipwrecks, and any place they can find remains to recover them and use DNA and other sources to identify them. My role is to find living family members who share mitochondrial and yDNA with the serviceman, find and confirm contact information for them, and report it to the Navy. It's a remarkable program.

Our December holiday party had to be canceled at the last minute when the library closed early due to a dangerous wind storm that came through and brought down huge pine trees and other trees all over town. No doubt the same storm came through your area that day.

In other Helena news, the new Heritage Center at the Montana Historical Society opened its doors in November. It's a stunning building with state of the art exhibits and technology. Contrary to the past, it's now open seven days a week, including weekends. We are excited to host the state conference there in September! The research library will be opening in the next few months and we are very excited to get in there and research again.
